Archiving Antigua: A Digital Record of Pre- and Post-Emancipation Antigua, 1760-1948.
Accessible at https://original-ufdc.uflib.ufl.edu/ARCHIVINGANTIGUA, this sub-collection of the Digital Library of the Caribbean features over 120 manuscript volumes documenting the lives of Afro-Caribbean Moravians in Antigua. - Digitized partial translations of diaries and minutes from Bethlehem, Nazareth, and Gracedale, Pennsylvania. We recommend keyword searching the translations for references to people of color as they are made by community scribes and diarists. Primary Sources

Note: most memoirs are digitized and accessible in the online finding aid of the Moravian Archives, Bethlehem.

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- Letter from Samuel Emlen of Burlington, NJ, to the Moravian Provincial Elders' Conference in Bethlehem, discussing the founding of an institution ("Emlen Institute") for the education of African American boys, 1825. Cataloged in the records of the PHC, Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.
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- Memoir of Rebecca, an African American woman, 1809-1830. Cataloged as MethBeth 0179, Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.
- Notes, by Nathanael Seidel, regarding various "African tribes" in the Danish West Indies (today's U.S. Virgin Islands), 1753. Cataloged as MissWI 175, Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.
- Travel diary of Christian Fröhlich's "visits to the negroes in Staten Island, Long Island, New York, and New Brunswick," accompanied by Andrew (*Ofodobendo Wooma*, identifying as Igbo), 26 November 1748-3 January 1749. Documents evangelism efforts by Andreas (Ofodobendo Wooma), a West African enslaved man in Bethlehem. Cataloged as MissInd 211.12.1, Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. There are additional diaries from Fröhlich and others, also visiting African Americans in New York and New Jersey, in the Collection of Travel Journals. Available digitized online.
- Various records regarding Rev. Charles D. Martin, the first Black minister of the Moravian Church in the United States, who organized Fourth Moravian Church ("Beth-Tphillah") in Harlem, NY, and active member of the NAACP during his lifetime (1873-1942).
- Various records regarding enslaved African American individuals in Northampton County, especially in Bethlehem and Nazareth, Pennsylvania. Cataloged as BethCong 422, Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.

Primary Source Collections (general)

- Eastern West Indies Collection. 120 linear feet of records from the congregations and the central administration (later Provincial Helpers' Conference) of the Moravian Church in the Eastern West Indies (St. Thomas, St. Croix, St. John, Antigua and St. Kitts). Note: there are no records from the other islands that are now part of the province (Barbados, Tobago and Trinidad). All records available at the Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Many records accessible in the Digital Library of the Caribbean.
- Jamaica Papers. 2 boxes of records from Moravian congregations in Jamaica. Available at the Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Fully digitized online at https://www.moravianchurcharchives.findbuch.net/php/main.php#4d6973734a6d63.
- Records related to several historically Black congregations of the Moravian Church in North America, including in New York and North Carolina. Some materials available at the Moravian Archives, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.
- West Indies Papers. 13 boxes of records related to Moravian missions in the Caribbean region, similar to the Eastern West Indies Collection; however, a different record group. Fully digitized online and accessible at
